Gravel/ Shoulder Resheeting

The 2022/2023 Gravel Resheeting Program will be carried out by Council Crews, anticipated to commence September 2022 for completion in March 2023 (weather permitting).

Bitumen Resealing

The 2022/2023 Bitumen Resealing Program is currently undergoing scope assessment, once finalised, will commence procurement for works to be carried out by contractors, anticipated to commence during months November/December 2022, when weather conditions are optimal and anticipated for completion in March 2023.

Patrol Grading

Prior to the most recent significant rainfall across the region, an interim patrol grading program had been established to allow crews to commence on roads that were unaffected by past weather events. Council's road network has again sustained damage to the unsealed network through its fifth weather event. Emergency works inspections across the network have been undertaken and works are being prioritised to roads across the region.

Roadside Slashing

Slashing crews have ceased slashing operations due to the current growing conditions. Crews have been reallocated to boom mowing and other vegetation control works across the region. Slashing will recommence under normal conditions when the growth of roadside grass approaches intervention level.



Recent storm damage and flood response

Nearing completion of emergency works relating to the Southern Queensland Flooding, 06 – 20 May 2022 event, Council experienced further asset damage as a result of the South Queensland East Coast Low, July 2022 Event. Council crews now continue to respond to Emergency Works under the jointly funded Commonwealth – State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA) relating to the South Queensland East Coast Low, July 2022 Event. Council is continuing it's discussions with the Queensland Reconstruction Authority (QRA) with a focus on reducing the impact on Council's budget with five consecutive activations currently requiring five Trigger Point payments of \$212,168.

So far, in excess of 387 July related Emergency Works sites have been completed out of 1327 identified. In some instances, these sites have been repaired multiple times, following previous events. Since the first severe weather event in November 2021, more than 6590 sites have been identified 4789 have been repaired under Emergency Works. Emergency Works under the July event are to be completed by 27 October 2022.

Two (2) sub-contractor crews are currently engaged to clear blocked road culverts as part of the Emergency and Immediate Reconstruction Works response, these works were scheduled for completion on 9 August 2022. Due to the South Queensland East Coast Low, July 2022 related event, these activities have now been extended until 27 October 2022.

The damage assessment phase to allow the long-term Restoration of Essential Public Assets (REPA) continues, via RACAS & Asset Edge Recover data and site verification visits. These assessments include those works completed to date to identify any new damage.

An external Contract to complete 16 roads was awarded to Yesberg Earthmoving and commenced in Early May. These works are now complete. Refer Table 1 below for detail.

To date approximately \$6.2 Million has been spent across the five (5) Events. The QRA has provided grant advances and a 30% payment on two (2) REPA submissions totalling approximately \$4.8 Million. Emergency Works and Immediate Reconstruction Works claims are currently being prepared and submitted to QRA for approval.

The current SBRC Works capital program and some of the operational programs such as patrol grading are being impacted by emergency and immediate reconstruction requirements. Our team are currently working through appropriate delivery solutions to address these requirements in conjunction with the flood damage task.

Council continues to identify dig out and repair works. The dig out and repair scope of work is still evolving as council and contract personnel continue to inspect roads and identify damage in and around the SBRC region. There are currently over 230 individual repair sites identified within the Kingaroy area. Refer table 3 SBRC Dig Out & Replace overview below.

In August additional works were undertaken at Alford Street East, Kingaroy and Streets in Murgon, taking advantage of the availability of hot mix asphalt. Refer table 4 SBRC Asphalt Repair Murgon & Alford Street East overview and photos below.

Blackbutt CBD Streetscape and Footpath Upgrade – Update 17 August 2022


Works along Roy Emerson Way (Coulson Street) are near completion with final street furniture to be installed in the weeks ahead.

Works in Les Muller Park are continuing with new concrete paths, shelters, fencing and turf complete. Soft fall to the playground, landscaping including additional trees and plantings are commencing in the weeks ahead.

New Footpath upgrade works in Hart Street, linking the Blackbutt CBD to the Rail Trail are planned to commence Monday 22 August. These works are planned to be completed in early September.

To maintain public safety some restrictions to vehicle parking and pedestrian access in Hart Street are expected, however these impacts will be limited and allow continual business access as construction progresses along Hart Street. BACKGROUND

Discussions were held during the August 2022 Infrastructure Standing Committee meeting primarily relating to the current flood damage repair work being undertaken within our Council area, and information requested on engagement of contractors, specifically the criteria used to award contracts, the current availability of contractors, and how reasonable are their offers. Council has sought two contracts to date for flood damage road repair through the Restoration of Essential Public Assets (REPA). The information below seeks to explain the current status:

Component 1: "The criteria used to award works to contractors"

The following evaluation criteria and weightings under the two Invitation to Offer requests previously released have been as follows:

Non price criteria

Previous Relevant Experience 10%
 Availability of Resources and Program 35%

3. Local Content 5%

Price criteria

1. Price & Value for Money 50%

Component 2: "How Council is going getting contractors to deliver works"

The first Restoration of Essential Public Assets (REPA) Invitation to Offer was extended to all suppliers on Council Panel SBRC 18/19-15 Civil Works through the Felix procurement platform. A contractors briefing was also held with five contractors in attendance. Two contractors ultimately priced for this work, with one being local.

The second Restoration of Essential Public Assets (REPA) Invitation to Offer was extended to all suppliers on Council Panel SBRC 18/19-15 Civil Works through the Felix procurement platform, as well as to 117 alternate suppliers via the Vendor Panel Road, Water, Sewerage, Civil Works – BUS270 approved supplier arrangement. Four contractors ultimately priced for this work, with one being local.

One contractor for the current two work packages has been engaged to deliver these works. There are expected to be multiple additional work packages released for Invitation to Offer to the market into the future. It is expected that contractor interest in these future packages would be consistent

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with the previous two works packages which has been relatively low. There are current discussions relating to how best to structure the work packages in order to maximise delivery opportunities.

Component 3: "The reasonability of offers"

The offers have been assessed against both a price and non-price criteria. In terms of the prices being seen, there is significant variability in some of the contractor prices, however to date the current two finalised contracts are within the expected budget. In terms of the non-price criteria, and given the time constraints that Council has to undertake this work, there has been a high weighting placed on the availability of resources and the contractors program for the delivery of works. The resulting assessment of this has also seen significant variability with respect to the scoring. Overall though, the current submissions for the two released work packages would generally be classed as reasonable.

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REPORT

This report is in response to a petition (Resolution 2022/348) received from the undersigned regarding the state of the roads, drainage and kerb and channel within Tingoora village which was presented at the General Council meeting held on 20 July 2022. Current Tingoora village and interested South Burnett residents have signed a petition requesting South Burnett Regional Council (SBRC) fix the long-standing water runoff and drainage issues experienced by those living in Muller Street, Magnussens Drive, Hill Street and Home Street. The resulting resolution (Resolution 2022/40) requested Council officers scope to upgrade to an urban sealed standard Muller Street, Magnussens Drive, Hill Street and Home Street, Tingoora and report back to the September Infrastructure Standing Committee Meeting with the estimated costs of delivering such.

Council officers have investigated and estimated the costs required to upgrade Muller Street, Magnussens Drive, Hill Street and Home Street to sealed urban standard. Due to the existing road formations being constructed to a rural road standard, to allow for the installation of kerb and channel to the aforementioned streets, the roads must be widened to a minimum 6m width to allow for proper drainage and two way vehicle movements to ensure the current road hierarchy remains in place.

The project scope includes widening the road width and includes the appropriate pavement and seal type (6m road width in Muller Street, Hill Street, Philips Street, Gibson Street and Home Street; 8m road width in Magnussens Drive due to road hierarchy), an upgrade from an open drainage system to kerb and channel and the associated earthworks to tie in the back of the new kerb and channel to the property boundary. The total estimated project cost for construction is estimated at a total of \$1.25M, with a breakdown as follows:

- Hill Street \$200,000
- Muller Street \$375,000
- Magnussens Drive \$237,500
- Gibson Street \$175,000
- Home Street \$162,500
- Philips Street \$100,000

Gibson Street and a section of Philips Street have been included in this report to assist with the kerb and channel alignments between streets and the topography of Tingoora whereby these streets are on the western side of the ridgeline that dissects the village.

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REPORT

Council has received a request through the Mayor regarding the installation of kerb & channelling (K&C) between the Kingaroy Hospital (Albert Street) and King Street intersection at the northern end of Youngman Street. Preliminary investigation into widening and median formalisation of the area between Banksia Drive and King Street was undertaken in 2012, but did not develop into a funded project.




Figure 1 - Proposed areas of widening

This report further investigates formalising the drainage on the eastern side of Youngman Street by widening and installing kerb & channelling in multiple sections; King Street to Edward Street, and Albert Street to Banksia Drive (shown below in Figure 1). The proposed alignment of K&C will provide a road profile which allows for future intersection treatments as required along Youngman Street and on-street carparking at locations where it can be achieved.

This layout will allow for future median beautification to enhance the northern entry into Kingaroy in alignment with Council's Corporate and Operational Plan.

The proposed widening works includes the installation of approximately 555 m of kerb & channel, approximately 3500 m² of road and pavement widening, line-marking, reconfiguration of underground stormwater infrastructure. The associated cost for sections along Youngman Street have been concept estimated at \$1.96M with a breakdown as follows:

- King Street to Edward Street \$ 620,000
- Albert Street to Banksia Drive \$ 1,400,000

The above orders of cost do not include the provision of any highway crossings, intersection upgrades, streetlighting or footpath extensions along Youngman Street. In addition, the King Street intersection is currently under investigation with Department of Transport and Main Roads (DTMR)

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
and Council's Infrastructure Planning department to improve safety and heavy vehicle logistics through Kingaroy CBD. It is anticipated that this project may be appropriate for funding, but development and further communications are still ongoing.

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6.6 KUMBIA CBD STREETSCAPE

PRECIS

Kumbia CBD Streetscape

SUMMARY

The Kumbia CBD Streetscape project has been developed in the 2021/22 Financial Year with a budget of \$300,000 from the Works for Queensland Program. The proposed Kumbia CBD Streetscape project focuses on redeveloping the infrastructure within Kumbia, including a dedicated pedestrian refuge crossing, renewal of kerb and channel, carparking, landscaping and People With Disabilities (PWD) bays.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That the Committee recommends to Council:

That Council approve the Kumbia CBD Streetscape detailed design for commencement of project construction with an additional \$50,000 accessed from restricted funds for Transport Assets, increasing the project value to \$350,000.

FINANCIAL AND RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

\$300,000 of funding from the W4Q Program to the Kumbia CBD Streetscape Project. Due to the increase in materials and services over the past 12 months, concrete costs have doubled requiring an additional allocation of money to be considered in delivering the scope of the project.

LINK TO CORPORATE/OPERATIONAL PLAN

COMMUNICATION/CONSULTATION (INTERNAL/EXTERNAL)

Community consultation sessions were conducted by Council on the following occasions:

• 5 October 2021 – Face to face informal sessions held at Rykes Fuel Kumbia

Feedback summary: Consultation Session One (1) was held at Rykes Fuel Kumbia from 9.30am – 2.30pm with 20 residents attending. Consultation sessions were advertised via media release and the Council website from the 28 September. This session was the community's first opportunity to have their say on the concept designs as presented and to provide their feedback regarding the key elements of the landscape design via the provided

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feedback form. 20 completed feedback forms were received and were found to be strongly in support of the project in its entirety.

• 19 October 2021 - Face to face informal sessions held at Kumbia Hall Supper Room

Feedback summary: Consultation Session Two (2) was held at Kumbia Hall Supper Room from 4.30 pm - 6.30 pm with 25 residents attending. Consultation sessions were advertised via media release and the Council website from the 28 September 2021. This session was held two weeks after the initial event to allow the residents, who were unavailable during business hours for the first session, the opportunity to come to an informal session to discuss the project with Council representatives as their schedules allowed. A project briefing was held during the timeframe as guided by the community present at the time. 25 completed feedback forms were received and were found to be strongly in support of the project in its entirety.

 Online Feedback – Online consultation with feedback provided via Council's website for Kumbia CBD Streetscape Layout

Feedback Summary: The Kumbia Streetscape design package and feedback form were advertised on Council's website for the duration of the consultation period to allow an additional medium for Kumbia residents to access the concept plans and have their say. A total of three (3) responses were received via email. The main concern highlighted was regarding the placement of trees in build-out planters, their effect on the heavy vehicle traffic and access to parking at Rykes Fuel, as well as visibility, the openness of the street and safety concerns. An alternative location of the bus shelter and bus stop was also offered, with placement desired to be closer towards the school for the school speed zone and convenience of the park for a bus drop off location for school students in the afternoon. This alternative location will also ensure the bus shelter will not impede on customer parking at the butcher shop and also the 'engineering works', if a business was to resume in the currently unoccupied building.

- Feedback Box at Rykes Feedback forms and a copy of the concept designs were provided to Rykes Fuel for additional resident feedback from the 20 October until 2 November 2021. Feedback Summary: After approval from the Mayor to extend the consultation period during the session held at Kumbia Hall on the 19 October, a Kumbia resident offered to deliver feedback forms and a set of plans to Rykes Fuel for further perusal by residents. During this timeframe, informative and structured consultation with Council representatives was not able to be provided to the residents as they reviewed the plans. The consultation in this situation was uncontrolled and the feedback reflected the lack of opportunity for consultation. 27 forms in total were received with 19 valid completed feedback forms, eight of a duplicated manner with responses strongly against the elements of the project and would prefer the town to be left 'as is'.
- TMR Feedback –Concept design issued to TMR Bundaberg office for review on 18 May 2021.

LEGAL IMPLICATIONS (STATUTORY BASIS, LEGAL RISKS)

Council is obliged to manage its assets in accordance with the requirements of the Local Government Act 2009 and the Civil Liability Act 2002. Much of the infrastructure located within the Kumbia CBD has either reached or is moving towards the end of its useful life. Reducing the number of defects in a CBD precinct will reduce Council's exposure to liability and future claims.

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ASSET MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS

The Kumbia CBD Streetscape project includes asset renewal works, whose main purpose is to address the existing condition of the CBD's aged assets. These renewal works look to renew kerb and channel due to damage from existing trees planted on the back of kerb contributing to pavement, kerb and footpath failures.

REPORT

The Kumbia CBD Streetscape project (Attachment One (1)) had been developed in the 2021/22 Financial Year as a 'shovel-ready' project for future funding opportunities and budget consideration. 2022/23 financial year budget discussions have been held and endorsed, with the Kumbia Streetscape project being approved for construction in the 2022/23 year with a budget of \$300,000 from the Works For Queensland Program. The proposed Kumbia CBD Streetscape project focuses on redeveloping the infrastructure within Kumbia, including a dedicated pedestrian refuge crossing, renewal of kerb and channel, carparking and People With Disabilities (PWD) bays; elements of the design which have been included from community feedback received during extensive consultations to ensure the project delivers to the community's expectations.

The Kumbia CBD Streetscape project has been designed to embrace the local historical context of the area and to celebrate Kumbia's uniqueness within the South Burnett region, with a rural feel. Kumbia is the southern gateway to the South Burnett with a strong link to the Bunya Mountains, and as such, has a high volume of passing tourist traffic. The Streetscape layout ensures that the intended trees and buildouts will not impede on the communities access and parking to the local businesses, with heavy vehicle parking at Rykes to retain existing access. The proposed parking and civil layout has been designed to comply with current regulatory and Australian standards for civil design and mandatory safety requirements. The proposed parking layout consists of no loss of carparks with two (2) car parks being reclassified and upgraded to PWD bays in central access areas of the CBD.

With an aesthetic that is subtle and one that reflects the history and identity of Kumbia, a community area has been developed featuring a rustic 'timber and tin' shelter that features a notice board and seating for access by the public and tourists, as well as doubling as a school bus stop for children in the mornings. This shelter will be placed near the proposed refuge crossing which allows for a safe location to cross the Bunya Highway. The plant species selected, reflect the rural character of the town and are largely endemic species. By introducing new tree planting within the wide road corridor, it will create visual cues to slow traffic whilst travelling through town, as well as 'softening' the street.

With numerous wet weather disaster events experienced throughout the past ten (10) months within the southeast corner of Queensland, there has been a significant impact on the construction industry, with substantial increases to construction industry inflation and market considerations. Council is not immune to these impacts and the Kumbia CBD Streetscape project estimate has had to reflect the cost inflations that have affected the industry. Council officers have investigated the costs of the project in line with the current project scope and recommend the use of an additional \$50,000 in reserves from restricted funds for Transport assets, based on the following options:

OPTION 1 - Council to allocate additional \$50,000.00

- Design as currently documented (Estimated cost = \$349,290.22) Attachment Two (2)
- Landscaping Works Includes shelter and associated furniture and 17 trees / medians
- Electrical Works Includes upgrade of existing street lighting only

Options to reduce the project scope and decrease design elements have been investigated, estimated and provided for Council consideration:

OPTION 2 – Reduction of trees (50%)

- Estimated cost = \$298,377.22
- Landscaping Works Includes shelter and associated furniture and 8 trees / medians
- Electrical Works Includes upgrade of existing street lighting only

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

REPORT

The safety of students travelling to and from school is one of the most important issues for school communities. The Department of Transport and Main Roads supports safe school travel with the SafeST program, which provides funding for projects that aim to deliver the safest possible journey to and from Queensland schools. The Markwell/William Street Bus Turnaround and Parking project was raised, due to concerns regarding the safety of motorists, pedestrians and school children, who use this facility. There are observed deficiencies at this facility regarding the intersection alignment and geometry, pedestrian provisions and accesses, signs, line marking and delineation.

The presence of incorrect, damaged and missing signage, as well as faded line marking, adds to the risk of driver error as there is not sufficient warning or indication of upcoming road components. It is acknowledged that the current pedestrian accesses, crossings and bus set down location facilities can be improved and contribute to an increased potential of vehicle/pedestrian incidents occurring. A concept layout can be found in Attachment One (1).

Potential funding sources are currently being investigated and will need to be considered and prioritised by Council.
